Sort it out! Make recycling easy and convenient. Put a recycling bin in your kitchen next to your trash can. Also, put one where you sort your mail or read the newspaper.



IDEA!

Your recycling bin can be a plastic basket or box, a wicker basket, or even a plain, old paper grocery bag. **Drop it in!** When you have something to recycle, drop it into a recycling bin inside your house instead of a trash can. When a recycling bin gets full, empty it into your big, curbside recycling container.

IDEA!

Paper Bag It: If you want to, put your recyclables in a PAPER grocery bag before dropping them in your curbside recycling barrel. This reduces litter on windy days. Please-NO PLASTIC BAGS. Plastic bags blow! **The Right Stuff!** See the list below for what to recycle. All recyclables can be mixed together in the recycling barrel.

Recycling Plastic Bags

Do NOT put plastic bags in your curbside recycling container!

Most grocery stores have bins just inside the front door where you can recycle old grocery bags and newspaper bags. Some other retailers — including Wal-Mart — also collect old plastic bags for recycling.

Follow these guidelines when dropping off plastic bags for recycling:

- Recycle grocery bags, newspaper bags, and old retail bags.
- Remove strings or hard plastic handles from retail bags.
- All plastic bags must be clean and dry.
- Remove all receipts.
- Do Not recycle food wrap (e.g. Saran Wrap®).
- Do Not recycle plastic bags that have had direct contact with food.
- Do Not recycle plastic bags that have been glued.

Remember, you can also reuse plastic bags by using them to line trash containers in your home. This saves you money because you can avoid buying new plastic bags.

Plastic bags are the most trashed plastic from California's homes. You can recycle plastic bags at most grocery stores including Albertsons, Vons, Wal-Mart, and Stater Brothers. Check with your local market to see if they are recycling bags too.

Additional Plastic Bag Recycling Information

Plastic bags are made out of "film", or thin flexible sheets of plastic. Most plastic films are made from polyethylene resin which can be readily recycled if the material is clean, dry, and not pigmented black.

Plastic bags are recycled into many different end uses. Many of the film bags are recycled into composite plastic lumber or siding. Other films and bags are reprocessed into small pellets, which are then sold to make new films and various injection molded products.

Note: Please notice what the drop off center in your area accepts when submitting your search. While some stores may accept all clean polyethylene, others only accept grocery bags. Information is not all inclusive and is believed to be accurate but should not be relied upon without verification. If you have a large quantity (much larger then the store's drop off bin), please check with the manager for appropriate drop off procedures.

TOP THREE TIPS!





Invest in some re-usable canvas or mesh bags and bag your groceries or shopping in them.



Before going shopping, bring previously acquired bags and reuse them.



Recycle your bags when you no longer can use at designated locations. Do not put them in your trash containers.

Curbside Recycling Guide



Empty all cans and bottles. Place your recycling container out in the street, with the wheels up against the curb by 6 a.m. of the collection day. Place the container at least two feet away from your trash bin or any other obstructions like fire hydrants or cars. Do not recycle any paper that is soiled or wet. No paper towels, tissues, napkins, diapers, paper plates, cups, waxed paper or photographs. DO NOT put recycle materials in plastic bags.
